Colleagues,

The Provost's Learning Innovations Grants (PLIG) program is now accepting proposals for projects that enrich the student learning experience at RIT while supporting faculty scholarship and university priorities. PLIG is an important source of funding for RIT faculty who want to explore new technologies and methods to enhance student learning, exemplified by the fact that the program has facilitated more than 230 faculty projects since it was launched in 2000.

This academic year, funding will range from \$1,000-\$5,000 per project, which must align with one of the following categories:

- **Exploration Grants** are funds for "proof of concept" investigations into the development, adaptation, or application of a new, different, or untried teaching approach, practice, or procedure.
- **Focus Grants** provide funds for faculty to develop, apply, and/or research an innovative mode or model of teaching and learning that directly supports an RIT priority. The focus area for the PLIG 2017 grant cycle is:
 - Applying an active learning model to (re)design and deliver all or part of a course.

All full-time RIT faculty (tenured, tenure-track, visiting, lecturers) are eligible to apply.
