## **Continue the Conversation:**

Adwoa Boateng of the Wallace Center, shares some thoughts on her role as a guide for students looking to develop their information gathering and analytical skills.



"Critical thinking is a process that I thoroughly enjoy facilitating in my Wallace Library position as the Science Librarian for RIT's College of Science (COS) and College of Health Sciences and Technology (CHST). The first round of questions I bombard students with are: What? Why? Where? How? What If? Have you thought of this? and Have you heard about GoogleScholar? These questions invariably generate puzzled looks...The best part of my job is to encourage overwhelmed students to think first and click second. Google has lulled students into thinking that all they have to do is press a button and instantly obtain answers without thinking. What I am observing is the information overload effect from both commercial published literature and noncommercial literature (Grey literature) which drives frustrated students to the Wallace library for help.
