## PROGRAM OVERVIEW FOR EMPLOYERS

The Criminal Justice program offers students a broad education with a curriculum designed to prepare them for a wide range of careers in criminal justice, to provide continuing education for those professionals already employed in criminal justice, and to offer a strong academic foundation for graduate school. RIT's approach to the study of criminal justice combines theoretical perspectives with practical experience. As students study in the areas of crime, criminal behavior, social control mechanisms, administration, planning, and management, the emphasis is on problem solving techniques based on the rapidly growing body of research in the field, as well as students' own guided research. The program is unique in its broad core curriculum, the scope of professional course offerings, and an intensive field experience, where students blend knowledge gained in required and elective courses with a career-oriented internship.

Bachelor of Science

### Enrollment

Approximately 200 full-time students enrolled in the undergraduate program.

### Cooperative Education Component

Required Field Internship senior year (10 weeks, 30 hours per week) with agencies or organizations.

Co-op is optional after three quarters of full-time study in criminal justice at RIT. Co-op does not carry academic credit hours.

### Student Skills & Capabilities

Upon acceptance into the Criminal Justice Program, each student is assigned a faculty advisor who assists in formulating career goals and planning a field of study in accordance with those goals.

Through core courses, students are exposed to the widest possible range of perspectives from which to view crime and the nature of criminal justice administration, thus broadening their career options.

During the junior and senior years, with faculty guidance, students select professional electives in a specific area of interest from courses offered within the program, within the college or in any of RIT's other seven colleges. Criminal justice faculty offer concentrations in criminology, law enforcement, law, corrections and security. Other concentrations, planned according to individual career goals, may include courses in computer science, management, photography, liberal studies, and social work.
