This year marked an exciting milestone for the Office of Career Services and Cooperative Education at RIT. For the first time in our history, we were able to offer a travel grant to support students embarking on co-op experiences far from home. This initiative, known as the Dean W. Crawford Travel Grant, was made possible by the generosity of a remarkable RIT alumnus who remembered the thrill of receiving a co-op offer and the reality of the costs associated with relocating.

The Dean W. Crawford Travel Grant provides students with \$500 in travel assistance, which they can use toward airfare or housing expenses. This support helps ease the financial burden of relocation, especially in cases where employers do not offer relocation packages. While RIT's co-op program is known for its paid opportunities, we recognize the costs of moving can still be a barrier for some. This grant helps bridge that gap.

In this year's report, you'll see the names of the inspiring students who received the Dean W. Crawford Travel Grant and learn about students who went on incredible co-op experiences across 49 states and 32 countries. Their stories are a testament to the power of experiential learning and the impact of alumni generosity.

We also welcomed a new president to RIT this year, William H. Sanders. We are excited about the future of RIT under his leadership and look forward to the continued evolution of our university.

Thank you for taking the time to read our annual report. We hope it inspires you to see the difference you can make in the lives of our students, because even a small gesture, like a travel grant, can have a big impact.

Behind the Numbers

RIT is a leader in providing experiential opportunities for students. RIT graduates benefit from these experiences with one of the highest rates of positive outcomes among private universities in the United States. RIT's Office of Career Services and Cooperative Education team establishes strong relationships with undergraduate and graduate students throughout their college careers. This report features data collected from summer 2024 through spring 2025.

Office

Data was collected from RIT Career Connect, powered by Symplicity. This career platform tracks various office analytics, including number of student appointments, event check-ins, and more.

Career Fairs

Seven career fairs were organized and executed by Career Services during the 2024-2025 academic year. Career Services obtained accurate student, employer, and alumni attendance through RIT Career Connect.

Cooperative Education

At RIT, cooperative education (co-op) is required in the majority of undergraduate programs and encouraged in most graduate programs. Students who complete a co-op must report their job to Career Services and submit a co-op work report at the end of their experience. As a result, Career Services receives salary data, learning outcomes, and feedback about how the experiences impacted their future career goals.

Graduate Outcomes

Through the First Destination Survey, Career Services learns about recent graduates' plans after graduation, including the employers they'll join and graduate schools they'll attend.

To collect post-graduation data, Career Services hosts events across campus, participates in graduation ceremonies, and collaborates with academic departments.

Career Services coordinators continue to support recent graduates in their job search process. Consistent with National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE) standards, recent graduates are encouraged to fill out the survey up to six months after graduation.

Office of Career Services and Cooperative Education

Career Services supports RIT bachelor's and master's degree students, as well as recent alumni, throughout their career development and job search for securing co-op and full-time opportunities. Career Services also provides tremendous support to employer partners for their recruitment needs through career fairs, information sessions, job postings and more.

Career Services organizes and executes the University-Wide Career Fair every fall and spring semester, connecting RIT students and alumni with employers ranging from small firms to Fortune 500 companies. Thousands of students from every college at RIT attend each semester to meet with employers recruiting top talent for co-op and full-time opportunities.

The next day, Interview Day, allows employers to hold in-person interviews with connections made during the career fair.

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Travel Grant

Through Career Services' new Student Clubs and Organizations Travel Grant, student groups can apply for funding to attend national conferences across the country. These experiences allow students to connect with industry professionals, learn from leaders in their field, and explore emerging trends and career paths. They also provide students with opportunities to showcase their work, expand their networks, and represent RIT on a national level.

During the 2024-2025 academic year, three student clubs and organizations received travel grants to attend conferences. Conferences included the National Society of Black Engineers (NSBE) National Conference, Society of Asian Scientists and Engineers (SASE) National Conference, and Society of Hispanic Professional Engineers (SHPE) National Convention.

Career Services looks forward to expanding access to these opportunities, which empower students to build connections and develop the skills that will serve them throughout their careers.

Classroom presentations were given by Career Services coordinators Career Services coordinators go beyond helping students find a job. Coordinators provide ongoing support to students by organizing workshops and information sessions, developing and teaching career preparation courses, and providing individual advisement. They offer job search strategies, resume and cover letter reviews, interview and career fair preparation, job offer and salary negotiation advisement, and more.

Career Prep Courses

Coordinators provide an in-depth professional development course that is embedded in a student's academic plan. The majority of students take this course before their first co-op or internship experience.

Employer Information Sessions

Employers and students have the opportunity to network and discuss co-op and full-time opportunities. Career Services helps coordinate the employer's virtual or in-person information session to ensure the most significant exposure to our Tigers.

Preparing Our Students

Mock Interview Days

Career Services hosts virtual Mock Interview Days prior to each University-Wide Career Fair in order to help students master the art of interviewing through one-one-one guidance from our employer partners.

Speakers and Panels

Industry experts participate in workshops and panels each semester to help RIT students in their job search and career preparation.

Workshops

Career Services strategically coordinates workshops that help prepare students to stand out among their competition. Students leave more confident in resume and cover letter writing, interview and career fair readiness, salary negotiation, and more.

Co-op Celebration

This end-of-year celebration highlighted the accomplishments of students who completed co-op and experiential learning opportunities. Students shared highlights from their experiences, and offered insights and advice for second-year students preparing for their co-op journeys. Attendees also enjoyed food and fun giveaways while building connections and learning from one another's experiences.

Students received the Career Services Travel Grant to help fund their work abroad experience As assistant director for international student career services, Julian Huenerfauth leads RIT's efforts to prepare globally minded students for career success—both those who come to RIT from around the world and those who pursue professional experiences abroad. Through a combination of advising, programming, and global partnerships, his work helps students translate international experiences into career-ready skills that employers value.

This year, the International Experiences Program expanded partnerships to nine program providers. RIT added new opportunities in Latin America, Europe and Asia, including a new 10-week computing internship program in Dublin and the continued hospital-shadowing program in Italy. Career Services also awarded 25 travel grants to make these opportunities accessible to more students and evaluated new programs through site visits in Costa Rica, Peru, Ireland, and Italy.

International students navigating the U.S. job search are also supported on campus. The newly-launched weekly publication, "Find Success in the USA: The Newsletter," reached an average of 1,618 readers—over 70% of RIT's international student body. The assistant director also led the Graduate Career Readiness Bootcamp, expanded international drop-in advising, participated in prospective student webinars, and delivered specialized workshops on resumes, cover letters, and interviewing.

Through these efforts, Career Services advances RIT's global mission to help students bring international perspective, cultural intelligence, and professional confidence to workplaces in the U.S. and beyond.



Counseling

Assistant Director for Career Counseling Tabitha Vick holds both Strong Interest Inventory and Myers-Briggs Typer Indicator (MBTI) Practitioner Certifications and works closely with RIT students to understand how their skills, abilities, personality preferences, work values, and interests align with potential career paths. RIT's career counselor emphasizes kindness and compassion, creating a supportive and understanding environment where students feel safe to share their hopes, concerns, and aspirations. Through this guidance, students build confidence, gain clarity about their strengths, and take meaningful steps toward long-term academic and professional success.

Individualized career counseling appointments help students clarify professional goals, explore career options through assessments, and navigate resources for informed decision-making. In addition to one-on-one support, the career counselor develops and facilitates workshops and classroom presentations on topics ranging from graduate school planning, exploration of alternative majors, coping with job search anxiety, and how to harness grit and resilience throughout the career exploration process.
