Fram Signature Lecture: "Thinking Critically About Pandemic Misinformation", with distinguished author, Dr. Cailin O'Connor. Tuesday, September 27, 2022, 4:00-5:00 pm, Ingle Auditorium, SAU. During the COVID-19 pandemic, false beliefs have spread that fall outside our normal understanding of misinformation. In this take, Dr. O'Connor uses network models to discuss two ways this happens. In the first, plausible scientific claims turn out to be false, but nonetheless continue to spread and influence policy. The second

involves cases where new scientific claims get attached to political camps, thus preventing normal discourse about these claims. Dr. O'Connor talks about how to address the sorts of misinformation that spread during the pandemic, and how to extend these lessons to a broader context. REGISTER HERE
