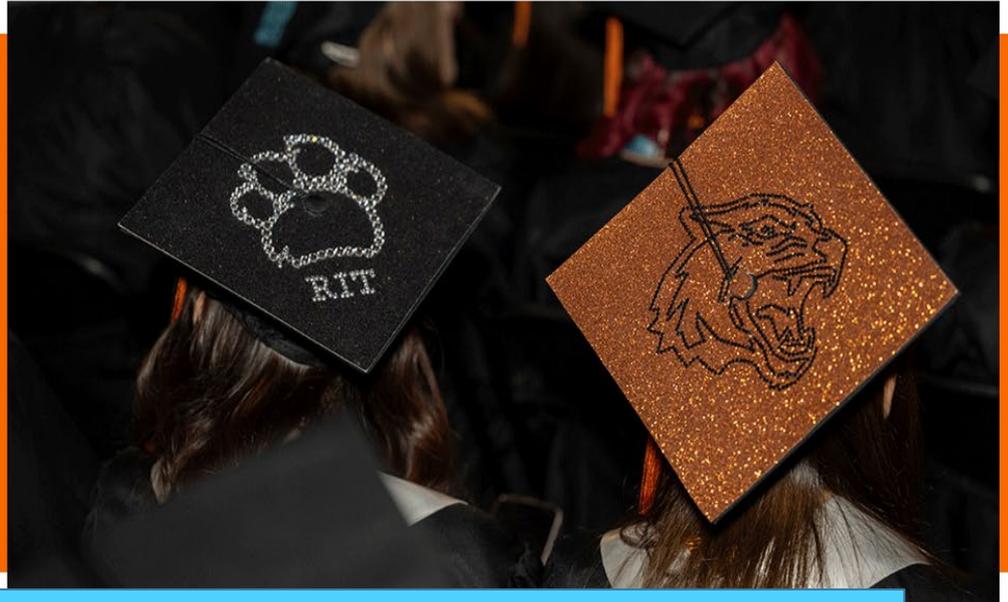

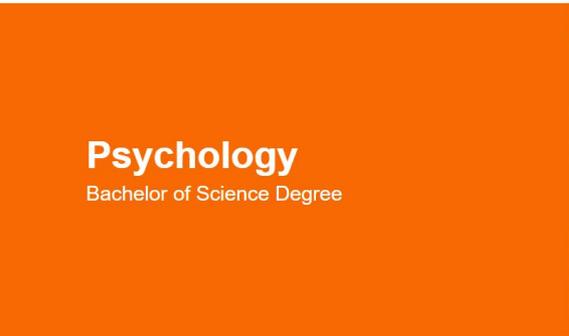

How to Read Your Flowchart

Prerequisite = A requirement that must be met/completed first *before* you can take a course

- Types of Prerequisites

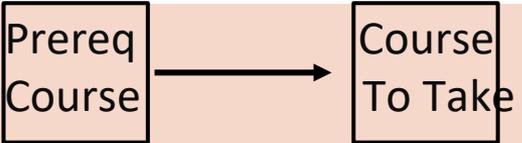
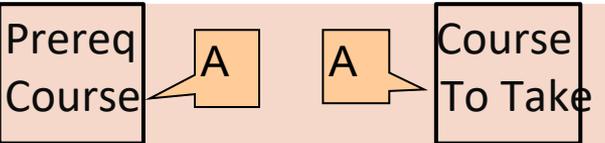
1. **Course** (eg. The *prerequisite* for Beginning French II is Beginning French I (you just need to pass with a D))
2. **Year-Level** (eg. The *prerequisite* for Organizational Behavior is 2nd Year Standing)
3. **A Grade in a course** (eg. The *prerequisite* for Calculus II is a C- in Calculus I)

Corequisite = A course that must either be taken *at the same time as* or completed before another course

- **Eg.:** The *corequisite* for Physics I is Calculus II = you can take Physics I as long as you are also taking or have already passed Calculus II
- Corequisites only work in one direction, so you could take Calculus II by itself

How to Read Your Flowchart

Requirements for a course are designated in 2 ways on the flowchart:

Terminology of Course Types

“Core Courses” = courses required by your major

“Electives” = requirements that can be fulfilled by a selection of courses that you can choose from

- There are different types of electives. Depending on the type, you will have a different set of course options (e.g. Math elective, Major elective, Science Elective, Free elective etc.)
- It is still a requirement you need to fulfill – you must choose *something*

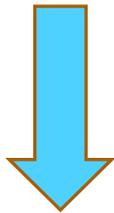

Major Courses (Track and Breadth)

In the BS Psychology degree, students must take 2 courses from 2 different interdisciplinary tracks. At RIT Dubai, students will complete the following tracks:

- **Biopsychology**
- **Clinical Psychology**

These tracks represent popular fields of research and practice to create a career-focused program, providing a strong foundation for employment in psychology-related fields or for pursuing graduate degrees.

Pretrack Courses prepare you for your track courses.

Breadth Courses give you a broader perspective of psychology-related topics.

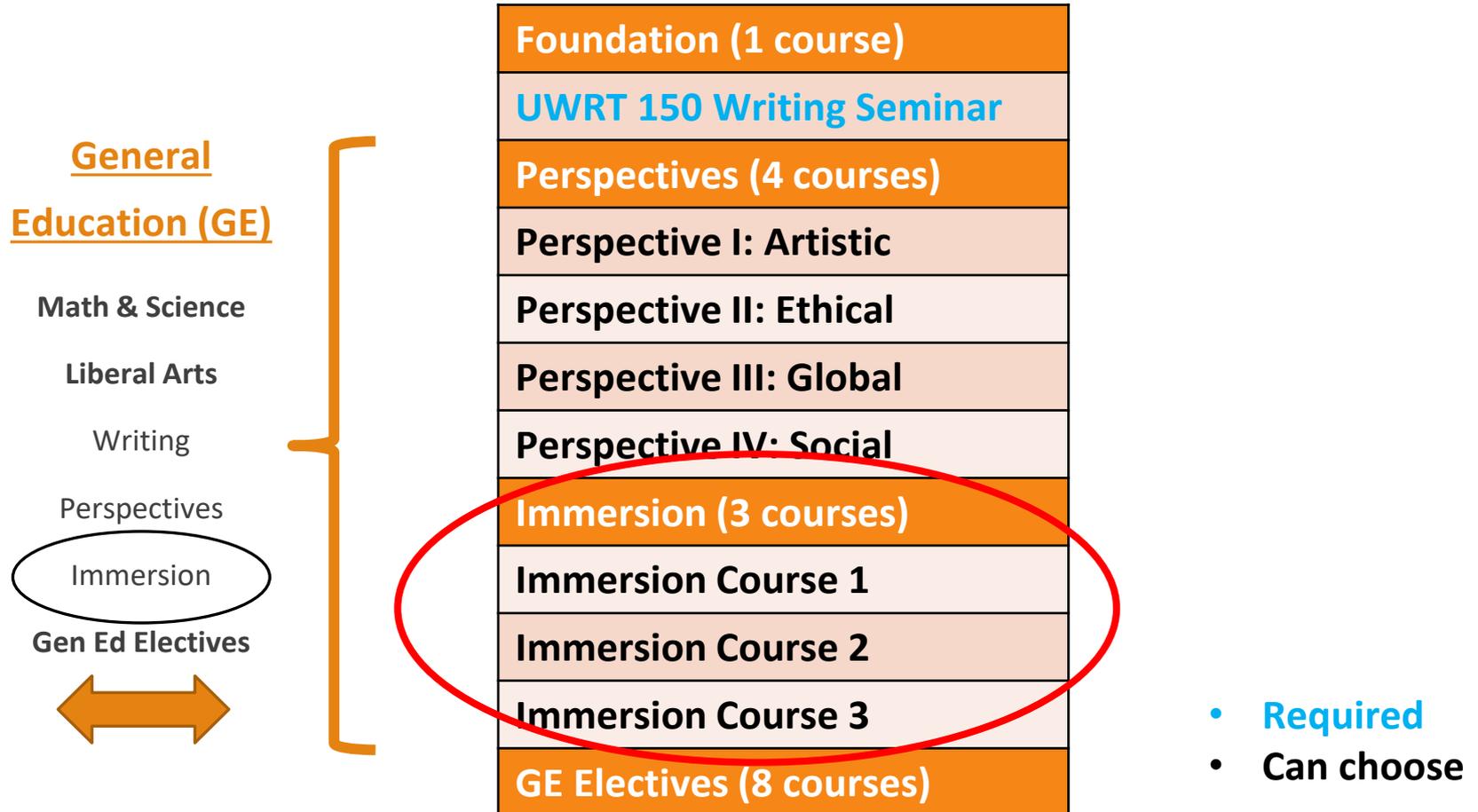

Perspectives (4 courses)

- These course categories are designed to introduce students to a variety of important areas of inquiry that provide ways of knowing about the world.

- Global
 - Social
 - Artistic
 - Ethical
- 1 course in each category is required to graduate
 - Different courses are offered in each perspective each semester
 - Some courses fulfil more than one perspective, but you can only use it once
 - Note that PSYC 101 Intro to Psychology is a Social Perspective course, but does not count as such for BS Psychology students

General Education – LIBERAL ARTS (Immersion)

Immersion (3 courses) = a series of three related general education courses supporting deeper learning **within a focus area**

General Education – LIBERAL ARTS (Immersion)

▪ **Special Notes:**

- **Psychology Immersion:** is closed to students in the BS Psychology program
- **Economics Immersion:** Microeconomics does *not* count in the immersion, but is a prerequisite for the immersion and is a Social or Global Perspective

General Education – LIBERAL ARTS

- Some Liberal Arts courses fulfill more than one category, but **they cannot double count!** You must eventually choose which requirement it will fulfill.

Minors

- Minors are usually 5 courses
- You **can** take a minor and an immersion in the same subject (e.g. Economics), so potentially, a minor that overlaps with your immersion would only require 2 additional courses.
- Minor courses can also overlap with perspectives

Gen Ed Elective (8 courses)

- These can be **any liberal arts, math, or science course** as well as a few others.
- UWRT 100 Critical Reading/Writing and MATH 101 College Algebra would count as GE Electives
- Your **Islamic culture course** can go here if it doesn't fulfil any perspective or your immersion

General Education – LIBERAL ARTS

(Additional Requirements)

Additional Requirements – these 2 requirements do not need to be a separate course, but can be fulfilled by a perspective, immersion, or Gen Ed elective:

☐ **1 Islamic Culture course** (required for RIT Dubai only)

Choose from (1 course only required):

- **ANTH 275 Global Islam:** (Global Perspective/Immersion: Religious Studies, Cultural Anth)
- **ANTH 365 Culture and Politics in ME:** (Immersion: Arabic, Religious Studies, Cultural Anth)
- **HIST 402 Early Islamic History:** (Immersion: History)
- **ARTH 549 - Topics in Global Art and Architecture: Islamic Art & Architecture:** (Immersion: History)

☐ **1 Gen Ed Writing Intensive (“WI”) course** (specified in the course description)

5 Open Electives

Make the most of them!

Can be:

- An extra course from your major
- An additional general education class
- A course from a different program
- A course towards a minor
- Pretty much anything!

as long as you meet the prerequisite for the course!

EXCEPT:

You cannot take an **easier** course

e.g. Pre-calc if you've already taken Calc I

Or a course that is **too similar**

e.g. Prob & Stats if you're taking Applied Statistics

Confused?

Don't worry. You will make an individualized, personal **Graduation Plan** with your advisor that will include all of these requirements so you can keep track.

This will be emailed to you and updated every time we meet, so keep it and refer to it often!

Co-op

- **“Co-op” = Cooperative Education**
 - Opportunity to gain meaningful **work experience** *before* graduation
 - **Full-time, paid** employment directly related to your field of study
 - Usually completed in the **summer between your 3rd and 4th year**
 - You should **not “graduate on a coop”**

Co-op Requirement

- **350 hours** of co-op (10 weeks full-time)
- Should require you to do **applied work** and be directly **related to psychology**
- You will take **PSYC 301 Junior Seminar in Psychology** in your **3rd year** to help prepare you for co-op and the co-op search process
- Your **faculty advisor** and the **Co-op Office** will be your best resources

Now What?

- **Mandatory Advising**
 - Every semester, you must meet with either your Academic Advisor or your Faculty Advisor before you can enroll for the next semester
 - You will discuss how things are going and what courses you should take next semester
 - This semester, first year students must meet with both!
 - Please **make an appointment on Starfish**
 - **If you want to come with a friend**, one of you make the appointment and write the name of the other(s) in the comments

Starfish Appointments

- **To book an appointment on Starfish ([video](#)):**
 1. Access **Starfish**  through SIS or MyCourses
 2. Click the “Starfish” menu icon, the ^, and Edit Profile to **CHANGE YOUR TIME ZONE**
 - “Display all time zones” and find “(GMT+04:00) Dubai”
 - Click “Submit”
 3. Go to “My Success Network”
 4. Go to your **Academic Advisor**, click on “. . .” and select “Schedule”
 5. On the next page, click on “Academic Advising” and select the most applicable reason for your meeting.
 6. Select the **date** and **time**
 7. On the next page, you can “change duration” to book a longer appointment, select the **Location** (in-person), and add comments/details that I will see
