	Faculty-Led <i>An RIT-Rochester faculty member takes a group of RIT students abroad as part of a course.</i>	Research <i>An RIT-Rochester faculty facilitates an international research experience.</i>	Direct Enroll <i>An RIT-Rochester student directly enrolls in an approved partner university abroad.</i>	Exchange <i>RIT Rochester sends a limited number of students to direct enroll for a semester to an approved university partner. The host university sends RIT Rochester the same number of exchange students.</i>	Affiliate <i>An RIT-Rochester student takes courses at a university abroad through a 3rd party organization like CIEE or IES that has an agreement with RIT.</i>	Global Campus Direct Enroll <i>Students directly enroll in an RIT campus in Croatia, UAE, China or Kosovo for a semester or year.</i>
Faculty Role	The faculty member develops the course and travel itinerary and travels with the students.	The faculty member develops the research idea, builds overseas partnerships, mentors student and assists the students in planning their travel logistics. They may or may not travel with the students.	The faculty member could introduce RIT Global to potential new partnerships then help onboard by mapping courses, evaluating safety, etc. and help market the program and recruit students to go. They do not travel with the students.
