

Please submit your Honors Points from the fall '25 semester.


Students must submit for Honors Points for all experiences other than Honors courses.

Planning an Option this spring? Check out all the information below to successfully submit your proposal.



It is a faculty-mentored, term-length project that extends the chosen course in a substantive way, whether in depth or in breadth. It is approved in advance by the course professor and the Honors Program office.

This exclusive setting will allow students to engage in dialogue with Glaude Jr. discussing the importance of James Baldwin's contributions to the civil rights movement and how his writings, social criticism, and cultural analysis are relevant and instructive in today's highly politicized world.
