A message from Honors Council President Ellie Fairchild:
Nominations are now open if you would like to run for a council position. Honors Council is the governing body of the Honors Program and helps plan many of the amazing events for students like you. Council is a great opportunity to gain leadership skills and have an impact on the Honors community. All Honors students are eligible to run for a delegate position for their college or a community delegate!

Nomination and Election Process

Delegates from each college and several community groups are elected to serve on the Honors Council for a one-year term that begins next Fall. Honors students can nominate themselves or one of their peers for each delegate position and President (nominees for President must have previously served at least one year on Council).

There are positions for ten college delegates, and four community delegates representing the following constituencies: BIPOC students, deaf and HOH students, internal admission students (students accepted to the program in spring 2025 are eligible to run), and international students. We will conduct a special election for a first-year delegate next fall.

The World Affairs Council for April will be led by Czech citizen with a doctorate in political science from Charles University in Prague, Dr. Martin Nekola on the topic, "The Rise of Populism in Europe". This discussion will focus on current developments in Europe since Russia's invasion of Ukraine in February 2022 and how populist tendencies are on the rise in the EU amidst the war and changing relations.


Complementary Learning
