The Research Question

Theme #1: EDC as Unavoidable Carry Items such as life-saving medical devices, bodily maintenance items, and sensory comfort. These items are indispensable and become essential by force of circumstance.

Theme #2: EDC as a Tool for Preparedness This includes items to facilitate access

and mobility including efficiency and daily task production. These items become equipped when we realize the need and benefit of carrying something.



"...It's super easy to open boxes [with this knife] at work, I can't really pull out an 8 inch pocketknife. "



Items reflect the values of individuals, their social alignments, and outward displays of identity. Many of these objects come into the daily carry through a generational practice, custom, or ritual.



Methods

RIT IRB Training and HSRO **Approval**

Background research, EDC literature review

Study design and informed consent

Ethical interviewing, awareness of risks

Recording device, → hand written/typed → notes

Descript transcription service, Nvivo coding software

Read and developed codes, 2nd round of coding

Developed themes, found exemplars, written analysis

Assembly of final product (ArcGIS Storymap) and development of ethnographic narrative
