Mission Statement

The Frederick C. Cuny Center for Peace & Conflict Studies provides an academic and multidisciplinary platform for studying the causes, practices, and consequences of war and political violence, as well the methods of conflict management and conflict resolution. The research and programs undertaken by the Center helps academics, international and local government practitioners, and civil society to understand the nuances of conflict, assist in the formulation of policies that effectively manage conflicts and promote peace, and advise on international peacekeeping and state-building efforts.

Vision

The core of the Center's aspirations is derived from its namesake, Frederick C. Cuny, a humanitarian and disaster relief specialist who revolutionized aid and relief operations. Cuny was unrelenting in his quest to help others based on visions of a shared humanity and the larger dream of peace. In his memory, it is the Cuny Center's vision to pursue the same mission to bring understanding, reconciliation, and transformation to communities across the globe by investing in research on peacebuilding, building programs that promote cross-cultural cooperation and knowledge preservation, and empowering youth through peace education. For students involved in the Center, we aim to help them develop a passion for humanitarian work and the critical thinking necessary for transforming conflict. The Center seeks to educate students and the wider population by drawing extensively from experiences with conflict, peacekeeping, and state-building in the Western Balkans. In this sense, the Center's vision rests on developing tomorrow's humanitarian leaders and preparing them for a future similar to Cuny's: riddled with impossible missions waiting to be transformed into opportunities for lasting peace.




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
New Interns and Fellows

Kosovo Civil-Military Relations Conference 2024

Despite Kosovo's need for strong civilian-military relations, and its unique perspective on this relationship, the field of civil military relations remains an understudied and unexplored topic in Kosovo and the region. In October 2024, the Cuny Center partnered with the Kosovo Security Force (KSF) to co-host a Security Forum on Kosovo's "Civil-Military Relations Amid Current European Challenges" with an aim to open a conversation about this important relationship, and to educate future practitioners. The forum welcomed up to 140 attendees and the audience included senior KSF officers, KSF cadets, RIT Kosovo senior faculty and students, senior U.S. officers and officials, Kosovo government officials and civil society.



Throughout the event, attendees engaged with four panels, featuring 17 panelists with experience in the security forces, United States government, and civil society. You can see the full summary of the event here, which discusses how the panelists:

- Engaged in a dialogue around civil-military relations between the security forces/military, government, civil society, and academia;
- Discussed best practices and identified challenges as well as opportunities for developing innovative approaches to complex problems; and
- Promoted cooperation and understanding between the military and the civilian population.

The forum aimed not only to educate, but also to engage, concluding with a large tabletop exercise that involved over eighty of the attendees, with RIT students and KSF cadets working together alongside the panelists and featured practitioners.

New: Graduate Certificate in Peace and Conflict Studies

Beginning in 2024, RITK students are now able to earn a Graduate Certificate in Peace and Conflict Studies. In this two year program students undertake three class-based semesters, one summer fieldwork assignment, and one semester of dissertation writing focused on how conflict is engaged, resolved, and transformed for the aims of establishing and sustaining peace.

Classes include research methods engagement, language building, and interest-focused electives like peacekeeping, international human rights law, and genocide studies. Taught by practitioners, this program aims to develop tomorrow's humanitarian leaders and prepare them for a future riddled with impossible missions waiting to be transformed into opportunities for lasting peace.

As a part of students' fieldwork, the Cuny Center is working to set up opportunities for students to be placed in organizations working on peacebuilding activities in Kosovo, such as the United Nations Interim Administration Mission in Kosovo (UNMIK) and the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE).

Fred C. Cuny Peace and Conflict Center 2024 Summer Program

Since our last update, the Cuny Center's 2024 Summer Program was a resounding success, advancing our mission to develop the next generation of humanitarian leaders. Our two program options, the Frederick C. Cuny Peace & Conflict Summer Program and the Len Hawley Human Rights Summer Program, provided participants with transformative experiences rooted in the history and contemporary challenges of the Balkans. The programs attracted a diverse cohort of students passionate about international peace, justice, and leadership. Through meaningful engagement with peers and practitioners, participants left inspired and better equipped to tackle the challenges of humanitarian leadership in their future careers.

Key Highlights:

- **Regional Travel:** Students embarked on a joint, one-week study tour to Albania, Montenegro, Croatia, and Bosnia and Herzegovina. This immersive experience allowed them to engage with local activists, explore historical sites, and gain firsthand insights into the region's complex history of conflict and reconciliation.
- Kosovo as a Living Laboratory: Students examined Kosovo's rich history of state-building and conflict resolution. The unique environment fostered deep learning about post-conflict justice, international peacekeeping, and reconciliation.
- **Practitioner-Focused Learning:** Courses were led by senior officials, NGO activists, and academics with hands-on experience in conflict zones. These instructors served not only as educators but also as mentors, shaping participants' professional growth as leaders in international affairs.
- Engaging Curriculum: Students selected from dynamic course offerings such as Human Rights in a Global Perspective, Transitional Justice and Reconciliation, and War and Peace in the Balkans. Workshops, simulations, and seminars on peacekeeping and reconciliation further enriched their experience.

We are deeply grateful for your support, which makes these impactful programs possible. We are looking forward to hosting our summer 2025 cohort to Prishtina June 23 - July 25, 2025!

New Journal of Peace, Conflict, and Security Studies




Learn How You Can Support: Global Giving Page


