



Ahira Webster Diary

• The **Ahira Webster** papers includes a diary from 1849-50, with daily entries describing **Webster**'s life at the New York Institute for the Deaf and news of events and people in the United States during this period, particularly about events preceding the American Civil War.

Also included is a brief biography of **Ahira George Webster**, a June 15, 1899 issue of Deaf-Mutes Journal, the 1849 Annual Report and Documents of the New-York Institution for the Instruction of the Deaf and Dumb, and a photocopied portrait of **Webster**.

DEAF WRITERS

POETRY

It is generally agreed that Poetry is the oldest of all literary genres and the first to be given expression in writing. Almost the same can be said of the literary achievement of deaf people inasmuch as the first writers on record who produced works of genuine merit were the French poets, Pierre Ronsard and Joachim du Bellay.

If Italy was the cradle of the sonnet form during the Renaissance, it was France that gave birth to the first deaf poet to carry on this tradition and influence future sonneteers. This was Pierre de Ronsard (1522-1585) who was aptly named "The Prince of Poets" by his literary peers and admirers, among them the three kings of France whom he served and their enemy royalties--Mary Queen of Scots and Queen Elizabeth I of England.

Ironically, it first appeared that Ronsard was destined for a life of political action because of his birth and breeding, his good looks and personality. A serious illness at the age of 16, however, caused severe deafness for several years and then left him hard of hearing for the rest of his life. It forced him








LEE BRODY TTY COLLECTION

- Collection of TTY equipment, business records, posters, and awards relating to telecommunications pioneer Lee Brody. TTY phones allow the deaf to use the phone to communicate.
- He started a non-profit company called Phone-TTY. He sought out donations of teletypewriters, which he would refurbish with modems.
- He developed the world's first Braille TTY used by the Deaf Blind to communicate by phone.
- His company also designed assistive devices, including doorbell and phone ringing light signalers and wake up devices.



Deaf Mutes Win Spurs On Production Front


Toledo—A "silent army" of 60 deaf mutes have joined the battle of production here.

ASL ranch proposed to meet needs of convent

Eye Festival project would provide total accessibility for conferences, tournaments, camping and retreats

LOS ANGELES – The concept of a year-round conference and training center that is accessible to all deaf people sited just outside Los Angeles was announced at the November, 1994 ASL Festival held in Pomona, California.

Fund raising with a long-term goal of \$2 million to purchase the site began this year by the Eye Festival Training Center, Inc. A non-profit corporation founded in 1988, it was responsible for organizing the

largest Deaf exposition in the country, the ASL Festival. At this festival, EFTC outlined the features the ASL Ranch concept.

This would house deaf conferences, conventions, tournaments, camping, retreats and training sessions. The design is to be barrier-free and totally visually accessible for all attendees. It will contain indoor and

outdoor text messaging and telecommunications devices, situated in a semi-rural area accessible by freeway in Southern California.

As a permanent facility, it would also welcome reationation by hearing records.



Deaf Japanese Students Rejected by Oregon

There were a dozen or more deaf Japanese youths in Oregon who were taken to relocation centers along with other Japs. These young people had never attended the State school at Salem. After being moved to their new homes, they suddenly wanted to attend the Salem School. Their request was denied by the board of control. Superintendent Marvin Clatterbuck was opposed to admitting these students, but sympathically suggested the government provide classes for them within the relocation centers.




