The First Century of Recorded Jazz: A Historical SurveyF2M

[NEW COURSE] [MULTI-PART SERIES] This course will survey the first 100 years of recorded jazz. The first jazz recording was made by the Original Dixieland Jazz Band for the Victor Talking Machine Company in 1917. From that starting point we will follow jazz's development highlighting major styles, movements, and trends. The survey will be informed by historically important recordings featuring the great instrumental soloists and bandleaders such as Louis Armstrong, Lester Young, Coleman Hawkins, Duke Ellington, Count Basie, Charlie Parker, Miles Davis, Sonny Rollins, Dave Brubeck, and John Coltrane. *Audio/Visual, Discussion, Lecture*

Peter Luce has taught jazz history courses at OLLI at RIT and the Chautauqua Institution. Beyond jazz his interests include drawing, classical music, photography, and, lately, Bob Dylan.

The Birth of the American EmpireF3M

[NEW COURSE] This course examines the growth of the American Empire. Immediately after the Revolution the United States began aggressively expanding across the continent at a pace considerably beyond a rate required by population growth. The Pacific coast was reached by annexing land purchased from France and conquered in a war with Mexico. Offshore expansion began by annexing Pacific Ocean islands like Hawaii. In a war with Spain we acquired Cuba, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Philippines with the intent of seeking captive offshore markets for excess American manufactured and agricultural products. Soon territorial expansion was no longer necessary, and economic power and numerous overseas military bases have subsequently been used to influence other countries' behavior for our economic benefit. This course examines this expansion and investigates how this was driven, from the beginning until the present day, by individuals of great wealth seeking to further expand their wealth. *Audio/Visual, Discussion, Lecture*

Romantic Period Composers: Under the InfluenceF5M

[NEW COURSE] Nationalist composers of the Late Romantic period such as Dvořák and Mussorgsky celebrated their cultural identities by drawing on the folk songs, dances, and local legends of their home countries. This course explores the relationship between Romantic-era composers and the Nationalist composers they influenced using musical examples to trace those connections. Some composers belong to both traditions, and we'll examine how that dual identity shaped their approach to composition. As with all of this leader's courses, the sessions are driven by audience interest and follow a "non-linear" approach, in this case, by identifying and following the threads that connect ideas across both eras.

Orbital: Where Science and Literature MeetF6M

[NEW COURSE] *Orbital* by Samantha Harvey won the 2024 Booker Prize. This short novel (200 pages) is not science fiction, but rather an artful combination of accurate science and good fiction that presents a realistic look at daily life on the International Space Station. We'll look at the writer's craft that deservedly earned Harvey this prestigious award. We'll talk about the International Space Station (now 27 years old), its past, its future, and its role in space exploration. We'll also examine some of the issues the book raises, not only about humankind's exploration of space, but of our relationship to our own fragile planet. There are no aliens knocking on the door, just a novel blend of interesting science and powerful writing.

[NEW COURSE] West Africa is unlike anywhere else on Earth. In Benin, Togo, and Ghana, ancient Voodoo traditions continue to shape everyday life alongside Christianity and Islam. Explore remarkable ceremonies, tribal cultures, the Ashanti kingdom, and the moving legacy of the Atlantic slave trade in a presentation with many photos and videos. Visit a fetish market, partake in funeral rites, and attend the Festival of Akwasidae at which the Ashanti chiefs gather to pay homage to the Asantehene, the Ashanti King. Try and understand what it was like in the horrific dungeons at Elmina, Ghana, where enslaved people were warehoused before being shipped to the new world. And much, much more. *Audio/Visual*

[NEW CLASS] Hear the name Hedy Lamarr and the first thing that likely comes to mind is: "The Most Beautiful Woman in the World". But Hedy was much more than a beautiful actress; she was a feminist, a pioneering female film producer, a ski resort designer, and, much to our benefit today, a ground-breaking inventor. This class will touch upon all of these facets as we seek to understand this complex woman. *Audio/Visual, Lecture*

17 X 6 = 112: Analysis of a Trump ConversationF10M

[NEW CLASS] When people talk, they're rarely pursuing just one goal. Conversations operate on multiple levels simultaneously—negotiating shared meaning, building alliances, persuading, flattering, and sometimes embarrassing one another. These dynamics become even more complex in group settings where participants must track each other's intentions while managing their own. This course takes a close look at a remarkable 80-second segment from *The Howard Stern Show* in which Stern aggressively poses a math pop-quiz question, "What's 17 times 6?," setting off a seemingly chaotic exchange among show participants, including Donald Trump, as they attempt to solve the problem and shape the narrative around it. Distinguished cognitive scientist Michael Spivey, Professor of Cognitive Science at UC Merced, analyzed this clip using a multidisciplinary approach, uncovering a rich web of linguistic patterns, social dominance effects, misperceptions, and subtle gestures that reveal how group cognition actually works. Professor Spivey will join us for part of the class.

Michael Tanenhaus is the Emeritus Bishop Professor of Brain and Cognitive Sciences at The University of Rochester. 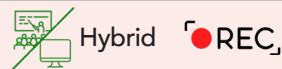

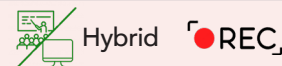

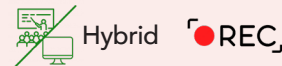


Abbott and Costello: Legends of ComedyF23M

Their impeccable timing made routines like "Who's on First" a comedy classic. Also highlighted will be the supporting players, especially on their TV show, who contributed to the mayhem in the world of Abbott and Costello. We will look at how Kate Smith and, later, Seinfeld factored into the popularity of the duo. We will also look at the dynamics of the relationship between the two which was fraught, at times, with jealousy and animosity. Brush Up Your Shakespeare: The Bard, Bardolatry, and Big Ideas (Part 2)..... F24T

[NEW CONTENT] Shakespeare is justly celebrated as a masterful poet and dramatist, perhaps the greatest writer in the English language. But do his plays have a larger purpose or intention; do they have ideas to share? What are his plays about? What do all those enchanting fairies and mythical Athenians in *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, not to mention the mechanicals' farcical performance of *Pyramus & Thisbe*, have to do with that play's otherwise mundane love story? Which Macbeth is meant by the title of that eponymous play? Why did Shakespeare choose to retell Homer's *Iliad* through Troilus and Cressida, two characters all but invisible in the earlier story. What do these oddities have to do with Shakespeare's overall point, if any? By closely considering his text, this course explores how such features point to Shakespeare as more than a "mere" playwright but also as a thinker with big ideas. This is a continuation of a course begun this summer, but prior participation is not a prerequisite for this session which will cover the three plays mentioned above, together with *Measure for Measure* and perhaps an additional play. Because we will be reading carefully, everyone is encouraged to read or reread the plays as necessary. **Optional Text:** Texts of plays *Discussion, Lecture, Reading*

An RIT philosophy professor as well as a practicing trial lawyer, **Rob Shapiro** has taught political philosophy and poetry, jurisprudence, the American founding, and constitutional law in the United States and abroad for over 25 years. In his courses Rob has regularly taught Shakespearean plays, either as the primary focus or as a complement to other readings. He is also a trustee of the University of Chicago's Tony-award-winning Court Theater (the "Home of Classic Theater"), board chair of a local opera company, an award-winning journalist, and host of a weekly radio show on classical music.

This course give you an introduction to the archaeology and theories for the Stonehenge prehistoric complex. It will introduce you to some of the difficulties in understanding a site whose last recorded use lies 3,500 years in the past, whose builders spanned 5,000 years, and whose meaning has been twisted to include everything from prehistoric supercomputer to Druidic temple. It will also bring in modern controversies as well as interpretation and preservation. The course approach will combine archaeological, environmental, engineering, religious, and folkloric data with landscape studies and social anthropology to explore this dynamic British landscape.

[NEW COURSE] The vast majority of insect species live solitary lives, with interactions among individuals largely confined to mating. Yet there are a few groups of insects—all ants and termites as well as some bees and wasps—that live in colonies with individuals specialized for different tasks. Depending on the species, these colonies can be made up of anywhere from a handful of individuals to millions of them. As a result these social insect groups make up a major fraction of the insect biomass on earth. Their ecological impact is equally important. In this course we will examine the ecology, evolution, and behavior of these insects as well as their effects—both beneficial and deleterious—on human societies. *Lecture*

John Jaenike has been interested in nature and science since he was a youngster. He studied biology in college and grad school and spent most of his career at the University of Rochester, teaching courses primarily in ecology and introductory biology and doing research on the ecology and evolutionary biology of various insects. Climate Change 101: The Likely, the Uncertain, the Unknown...and Why It Matters..... F31T

[NEW COURSE] Global climate change is a major environmental topic in the news these days, but it can be a challenge to understand the science, models, and probabilities involved in the stories and reports that come at us from many sources (often, unfortunately, promoting a hidden non-scientific agenda). It can be even more challenging to handle this topic if we consider its potential social and ethical perspectives. In this course we will discuss, in non-expert language, the basics of the scientific underpinnings of our understanding of global climate change, including what it is (and isn't) and the supporting evidence in our observations and measurements. We will move from there to a general discussion of the models involved and their basic structure and probabilities. We will then consider an overview of the expectations derived from our models, how they've changed over the years, and the apparent options we have as a result. We will then finish with the expected outcomes of various scenarios for people in NY, the country, and the world and discuss both what we can do and a few perspectives that can help inform our decisions. **Course Website:** TBA *Audio/Visual, Discussion, Lecture, Reading*

[NEW COURSE] Igor Stravinsky (1882–1971) was one of the 20th century's most astonishing musical innovators. During a career spanning more than 60 years, he repeatedly surprised audiences by reinventing his musical style—from Russian fairy tales and lush ballets to elegant neoclassical works and powerful sacred music. At the core of his achievement stands *The Rite of Spring* (1913) whose Paris premiere provoked one of the most famous incidents in music history. But Stravinsky was far more than the composer of one revolutionary work. Each class will combine Robert Greenberg's engaging (and humorous) lectures with performances and video excerpts from some of the world's finest musicians and dance companies. We will also hear insights from conductors and teachers including Leonard Bernstein, Alan Gilbert, and Gerard Schwarz, who will help us listen. We will be able to experience Stravinsky's music as well as to understand it. We will follow Stravinsky's artistic journey through colorful orchestral works, groundbreaking ballets, theatrical masterpieces, and masterful collaborations with Sergei Diaghilev and the Ballets Russes. We will discover a composer of wit, drama, and boundless imagination who never stopped surprising audiences—or reinventing himself. *Lecture*

Victor Poleshuck is a retired physician with a lifelong love of classical music. He has led many courses focused on medicine and music at OLLI at RIT including a four-term course on the History of Western Music, and a number of composer-specific courses, most recently on Franz Joseph Haydn. Other courses have included Beethoven, Mozart, Clara and Robert Schumann, Tchaikovsky, Brahms, and Shostakovich.

Listen to *Murder Most Foul*, released during the pandemic, about which *The New Yorker* critic, Kevin Dettmar, wrote: "What a weird new song for Bob Dylan to drop 'Weird' with its full Shakespearean force, as in the 'weird sisters' of *Macbeth*, possessing 'the supernatural power of dealing with fate or destiny,'" and his version of *Once Upon a Time* for Tony Bennett's 90th birthday tribute. After coming back from the abyss with the Grammy-winning, *Time Out of Mind* in 1997, Dylan began building on themes that he explored in his earlier work expanding intertextuality in songs to include literature and film, warping time and place to create complex, multi-textured songs, and compelling music. We begin with Dylan's most recent work, then follow his journey from the 1990s listening to, analyzing, deconstructing, and contextualizing his songs. We will also use excerpts from his radio show, books, and tributes to musicians to gain some insight into one of the most original, enigmatic, and creative minds in music, and the humanities writ large. *Audio/Visual, Discussion, Lecture*

Michael Tanenhaus is the Emeritus Bishop Professor of Brain and Cognitive Sciences at The University of Rochester. Michael received the 2018 Rumelhart Prize for work with his students that, according to the selection committee, "over the course of 40 years gradually transformed our understanding of human language and its relation to perception, action and communication." Since he joined OLLI at RIT in 2018, he has led courses on a variety of topics related to language and cognitive science, but the ones on Bob Dylan are his favorites.

The Making of the Modern Mind: Descartes's Meditations (Part 1 of 2) F38W

[NEW COURSE] [MULTI-PART SERIES] In the *Meditations* (1641), the founding work of modern philosophy, Descartes states two intentions. The Dedication Letter to the Religious Faculty of the Sorbonne states the intention of persuading the rational infidels with rational arguments that God exists and that the soul is immortal. The opening sentence of Meditation One states the intention of providing a philosophic foundation for the new science of mathematical physics. In the process of executing these two intentions, Descartes establishes the modern conception of the soul as exclusively mind or consciousness, thereby inaugurating subjectivity as a philosophic foundation. To interpret the *Meditations* is to determine the relations between the theology, the theory of science, and the account of subjectivity. **Required Text:** *Discourse on Method and Meditations on First Philosophy*, Fourth edition by Rene Descartes, ISBN 9780872204201 *Discussion, Lecture*

Walt Soffer, Ph.D., is Professor Emeritus of Philosophy at Geneseo State University of NY and recipient of the Career Service Award and Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching. His teaching and publications have been principally in the areas of ancient philosophy, modern philosophy, phenomenology and existentialism, history of political philosophy, ethics, philosophy of religion, and interdisciplinary humanities.

Oligarchy in America: The Lessons of Civil War Reconstruction F43W

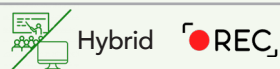

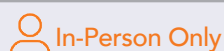
Introduction to Mandarin Chinese for ConversationF45Th

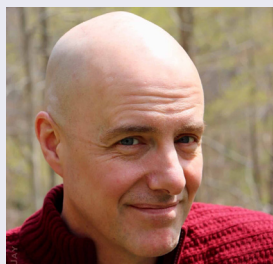


Mary Rose McBride, Lifespan's VP of Marketing & Communications

Far from obsolete in the age of search engines, libraries are filling critical gaps in today's digital and social landscape. Modern libraries maximize space with collaborative worktables and shared workspaces, and now lend tools, instruments, fishing poles, sewing machines, and artwork. They're also becoming proving grounds for AI literacy, helping patrons identify AI-generated content, use AI tools ethically, and understand algorithmic decision-making.

When Brian Green was appointed Monroe County District Attorney in the fall of 2025, he inherited an office in need of rebuilding, both in its internal culture and in its standing with the community. In this candid and timely presentation, DA Green will reflect on the challenges of stepping into one of the county's most visible public roles during a moment of institutional scrutiny, and share his vision for restoring trust in the justice system. He will discuss his hands-on approach to leadership, his commitment to treating staff, community partners, and the public with professionalism and dignity, and his philosophy of ethical

prosecution. He will also address how the DA's office can strengthen its relationships with county agencies, schools, and civic organizations as well as what it means to protect Rochester's communities from violent crime while ensuring that justice is pursued with fairness and transparency.

Along the way we'll examine how these stories continue to influence modern figure skating and, when appropriate, highlight connections to Rochester and the surrounding region. No prior knowledge of figure skating is required—just curiosity and an interest in the stories behind one of the world's most captivating sports. *Audio/Visual, Discussion*

Jamie Orlandi, like many, grew up a casual figure skating fan but became an avid one after the 2002 Salt Lake City Olympics. Since then she has spent countless hours watching, reading, and attending live events from US Nationals to the World Championships. Jamie enjoys sharing not only the athletic performances, but also the rich history, memorable personalities, and behind-the-scenes stories that have shaped the sport—from legendary champions and pivotal moments to the coaches, choreographers, federations, and controversies that continue to influence figure skating. In this course we will examine the first vampire stories in the English language (to include *The Vampyre*, *The Black Vampyre*, and *Carmilla*) as well as watch essential films in the corpus of over 700 titles available (such as *Nosferatu*, *A Girl Walks Home Alone at Night*, *Let the Right One In*). We will discuss the evolution of the Vampire character, what its portrayal says about society, and discuss why its presentation in literature frequently introduces themes that were frowned upon in polite society. What does the very first vampire story have to do with *Frankenstein*? Is the *Black Vampire* one of the earliest stories that contains an anti-slavery theme? Is *Carmilla* one of the earliest lesbian stories? It's said that every generation gets the vampire it deserves. Which one do you deserve? *Audio/Visual, Discussion, Lecture, Reading*

Gary Mitchell has had a fascination with vampires since he first read *Dracula* at the age of 12. He found the book so terrifying that he kept it on the front porch with a brick on it to avoid a visit from the Count. In this course he will introduce you to vampire lore, and monsters that still haunt our books and movies today.

Who is the hero? Who is the villain? Should honorable men use violence when they see a demagogue rising to power? Do their actions produce a better society—and does violence corrupt the doers? Contemporary relevance? You bet.

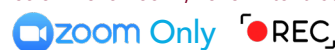


Orbiting JupiterF74E

The giant planet Jupiter has captivated astronomers, scientists, and inquisitive minds for centuries. From Galileo's first telescopic observations of four of its moons in 1610 to exploration by today's cutting-edge spacecrafts, Jupiter has proven to be one of the most scientifically rich objects of investigation in our solar system. This two-session course takes participants on a guided journey through decades of exploration, drawing on data from NASA's Pioneer, Voyager, Galileo, and Juno missions. The course will investigate the physics, geology, and astrobiology of the Jovian system and confront one of science's most tantalizing questions: could life exist in our own cosmic backyard?

Janet Wood is a volunteer for NASA/JPL's Solar System Ambassador program coordinated by the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, California. Ambassadors present public programs to communicate the excitement, science, and discoveries of NASA's space exploration missions. Wood became a space science enthusiast after attending The Planetary Society's "Planetfest" in 1997 in conjunction with the Mars Pathfinder Landing, and joined the Solar System Ambassador Program in 2002. She earned a Bachelor's Degree in Education from the University of Washington, and a Master's Degree in Geoscience Education from Mississippi State University. Her special interest is in planetary science.

Sapiens II: The Agricultural Revolution.....F75E

This course is the second in a planned four-course sequence based on Yuval Noah Harari's *Sapiens: A Brief History of Humankind*. The sequence can be taken in order or independently. This course focuses on Part Two of Harari's book, the Agricultural Revolution and its consequences - one of the most consequential and most debated transformations in human history. Beginning with the first agricultural communities in the ancient Near East around 10,000 BCE, the course traces the emergence of villages, cities, kingdoms, and empires, examining what farming made possible and what it cost the people who adopted it. Along the way we consider how hierarchies, laws, and religions emerged as tools for holding complex societies together, how writing transformed human memory and administration, and how Harari builds his case that the Agricultural Revolution was not a liberation but a trap - one that most of humanity has never fully escaped. The course closes at the end of Harari's Part Two, with the great empires of the ancient world firmly in place. Throughout the course, particular attention is given to separating well-established evidence from interpretation and informed speculation.

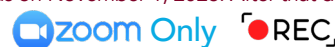


The Crusades: History, Causes and Lasting EffectsF76E

We trace the Crusades from the world that spawned them to their enduring legacies, beginning with the pressures facing Byzantium, the Islamic Golden Age, and the feudal rivalries of medieval Europe. We examine the religious, political, and economic forces behind the First Crusade and the fall of Jerusalem in 1099. We follow the Muslim resurgence under Saladin, his rivalry with Richard the Lionheart, and the decline and fall of the Crusader movement through the fall of Acre in 1291. We close with legacies of cultural exchange, military orders (e.g. The Templars) and lasting tensions.

Born in Lebanon, **Samih Baalbaki** is a lawyer by training who spent 17 years in Dubai working on projects across 22 Middle Eastern countries giving him knowledge of the region's cultures and history. He audited 12 college courses on comparative religions and the Crusades and taught at four OLLI programs for the past 14 years.

Join the Honorable Jennifer G. Zipps, Chief Judge of the United States District Court for the District of Arizona, and her law clerk, Iesha Phillips, for a three-part series on how free speech shapes everyday life, empowers individuals to challenge unjust systems and strengthens democracy. Using real-world examples, the series will explore when speech is protected, when the government can set rules, and how the First Amendment applies to protests, schools, public meetings, journalism, social media, and controversial speech.

Chief Judge Jennifer Zipps earned a Bachelor of Arts degree with honors from the University of Arizona and a J.D. cum laude from Georgetown University Law Center. After clerking for the Honorable William Canby on the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals, she was an associate at Molloy, Jones and Donahue in Tucson, Arizona, focusing on business litigation and bankruptcy matters. Judge Zipps worked at the U.S. Attorney's Office for ten years, serving as an Assistant U.S. Attorney in the Civil Division, Chief of the Civil Division, and Chief Assistant. Judge Zipps was appointed as a United States Magistrate on April 4, 2005, received her commission as a U.S. District Judge on October 5, 2011, and became Chief Judge on October 21, 2024. She will be joined by her law clerk, **Iesha Phillips**, who grew up in Tulsa, Oklahoma, graduated Phi Beta Kappa from Oberlin College, and earned her J.D. from Yale Law School. Iesha has enjoyed her time in Tucson and plans to practice in New York City following her two-year clerkship.

In this study group, we will explore four geological stories that reveal how our dynamic planet has shaped climate, civilizations, and even human origins. From sudden global darkness to the near-collapse of ancient societies, from a restless supervolcano to the deep forces that helped create us, each session blends science, history, and discovery to uncover how we know what we know and what remains uncertain. **Sessions include:** 536 CE: *The Worst Year to Be Alive?*; *The Bronze Age Collapse: When the Ancient World Almost Unraveled*; *Campi Flegrei: When a Volcano Won't Decide What It's Doing*; and *Apes Born of Plate Tectonics: When Earth Creates Instead of Destroys*. Together, these stories reveal not only how geology can disrupt the world around us, but also how life endures - and even emerges - from those same forces. Together, we will explore these stories and gain a deeper appreciation for the dynamic planet we call home.

Nicola Richmond is the Vice Chancellor of Strategy, Analytics and Research at Pima Community College. She oversees strategic planning, institutional and operational effectiveness, federal and state reporting and ad hoc reporting at the institution. She has an extensive data analysis and research background that most recently focuses on higher education, but her experience also includes the analysis of magnetometer data for the moon and Mars, and the application of cellular automata models to coastal environments. She has a Ph.D. in Geology from University College London. Her doctoral research focused on the incorporation of aluminum and iron into deep Earth magnesium silicate minerals using numerical modeling approaches from quantum mechanics and solid state physics. Nic has a strong interest in cross-disciplinary research approaches, taking techniques from the sciences and bringing them to higher education research.

Intellectual and Cultural History of the West: Part I, The Greeks..... F82E

This course concerns itself with the History of Ideas. History of Ideas is a branch of history that explores the climate of intellectual thoughts in given eras, similar to and a background to the history of political, economic, or military events during these eras. This era is focused on the ancient Greeks and extends from the Dark Ages of the Greeks to the late Hellenistic age or around 700 BC to 400 AD. We will look at the "great thinkers" like Plato and Aristotle and also other "schools" of thought like the Stoics and the Pythagoreans, et al. We will also survey art and ethics, e.g. Homer and Sophocles. There is a current and a continuum in Western thinking that still feeds our current take on cosmology (how the world works), epistemology (what is "truth" or "realism") and what we value. This fall course is the first part of a series that will be followed by later courses on Medieval thought, Early Modern, and Modern. No previous philosophical study is required but there will be short readings. Discussion and class participation are strongly encouraged.
