

Dr. Norimune (Nori) Kawai is an assistant professor in the Center for Special Needs Education Research & Practice at Hiroshima University, Japan. His primary area of interest involves speech and language disorders. Particularly, his research topics are listeners' auditory perceptions of stuttering, attitudes toward people who stutter, and speech motor activities of people who stutter.

Nori received his Bachelor of Education in Deaf Education from Hiroshima University, Japan. He earned his master's degree in Special Education from the same institution. In 1998, Nori went to the U.S.A. to gain knowledge of speech-language pathology and received his Master of Arts in Speech, Language, and Hearing Sciences from the University of Colorado at Boulder in 2002. Then Nori worked as a speech-language pathologist at Adams County School District No. 50, Westminster, Colorado, U.S.A.

In 2003, Nori moved to Nebraska and was enrolled in the doctoral program in Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. As a research assistant, he taught various classes in communication disorders, supervised graduate students working in the Speech-Language-Hearing Clinic at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, and conducted several research studies in fluency disorders.

Nori received his doctoral degree in 2007 and came back to Japan as a faculty member at Hiroshima University. He holds the Certificate of Clinical Competence (CCC) in speech-language pathology and works with children and adults who have various communication disorders. Now Nori's caseload exceeds over 30, which is pretty heavy for faculty members; however, he enjoys seeing clients, teaching students, and conducting research projects.
